COMPASS: THE 100 CLUB 6.30pm, ABC1

They may be older than 100 but that won't stop Ruth, Olive and Dexter pursuing their dreams. In this inspiring documentary we see Ruth, born in 1909, defying the odds and sweating up a storm as she trains to break her own athletics world record. Thespian Olive, born in 1907, is still performing on stage and Dexter, born in 1910, is writing his fifth book – despite being unable to see the end of his pen. This is a must watch. – **RS**

CASTLE 9.45pm, Seven

In the season four finale, Beckett (Stana Katic) is hanging from the edge of a building, seemingly set to plummet to her death. But – wait for it – cut to predictable caption: "Three days prior". TRICKY BUSINESS 8pm, Nine

Kate (Gigi Edgley) has always been one to bite off more than she can chew, then chew like hell. But this week her plate is overflowing, Daughter Emma (Odessa Young) is back so she's upping her efforts to be the perfect mum. She's also trying desperately to be a super sister to Lily (Sophie Hensser), keep the business ticking along nicely and deal with her growing attachment to Matt (Antony Starr). So the last thing she needs is for a dodgy builder case to go pear-shaped. **– DS**

THE FINDER 9.30pm, Ten

HOUSE 9.30PM, Ten

House (Hugh Laurie) and his team seem tired on the downhill run of their final season. It's not that this episode is bad, it's just that it's not outstandingly good. The cleverness is still there, but tonight it's sporadic. The kookiness remains, but we're almost weary of it. Tonight, sexy "Mrs House", Dominika (Karolina Wydra), returns, roping House into a plan to fool immigration that the pair is actually married. Naturally, House makes it everybody else's problem as well as his own.
